

TIBET

Since Lhasa was first opened to tourists in 1981 we at Third Eye Travel have been actively running trips into Tibet in association with our local Tibetan partners in Lhasa. The road to Lhasa from Kathmandu was opened to tour groups in 1984 and whole new type of trip became possible. Tibet's capital, Lhasa, the roof of the world, is not only as the earth's highest ecosystem and one of its last remaining great wildernesses but also as the source of Asia's greatest rivers. It shares a 3482km international border with India, [Bhutan](#), Nepal and Burma, and is bordered to the north and east by the Chinese provinces of Xinjiang, Qinghai, Sichuan and Yunnan. Tibetans call their homeland "BO" and BOPA are the people of Tibet. With the cultural revolution dying a well-deserved death, the true Tibet has made a small resurgence; though not as much as some of us would like to see. However, there has never been a better time to visit Tibet. Prohibitive prices of tours, a general feature in early 80's is a thing of the past. Services are greatly improved. The Chinese government has spent a huge money on the infrastructure like road, bridges and recently bringing the train across the Tibetan Plateau which is one of the marvellous engineering feats. The Lhasa Kathmandu road has been improved significantly.

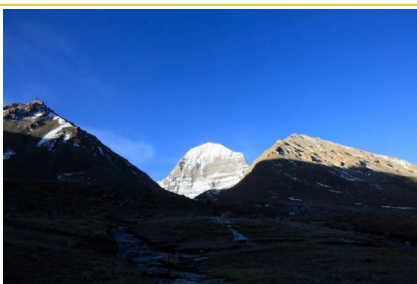


TIBET, NEPAL AND BHUTAN (14DAYS) LAND COST: US\$ 2899.00 + INTERNAL AIR: \$1250.00

Next you fly from Kathmandu to Paro, [Bhutan](#). Enjoy the stunning views of the eastern Himalayan range. Mt. Everest (29028 ft / 8848 m), Mt. Makalu (27815 ft./ 8478 m), Mt. Kanchenjunga (28160 ft / 8585 m) and a host of other mighty Himalayan peaks. You leave the multitudes behind and enter the Land of the Thunder Dragon. Bhutan offers the experience of the Buddhist tradition in a setting of unique architecture and breathtaking Himalayan landscape. The friendly people of Bhutan share their traditional lifestyle untouched by outside influence. It is a unique opportunity to experience *Himalayan Buddhist* culture not influenced by the outside world.

The ultimate [Tibet](#) Trip ! Not only does this trip involve overland drives, it also involves the trekking around Kailash on foot from west to east before you eventually drive out to Kathmandu. You will fly from Chengdu to Lhasa where you will have the sightseeing tours of some of the beautiful monasteries. You will begin your journey from Lhasa to Darchen via Shigatse & Saga, then begin your trek around Mt. Kailash. Upon completion of this circuit you will drive back via southern route to Lhasa before returning home or an extension to Nepal.

The Ganden to Samye trek route has proved to be one of the most captivating of all Tibetan treks with rich variety of scenery from high snowy passes to *lush alpine meadows to the desert like environs of the Samye monastery*. There are secluded valleys inhabited by nomads and yaks. This pilgrimage route is well-used by Tibetans who combine a visit to Ganden, The principal monastery of yellow hat sect with a hard but reasonably direct walk to Samye , the first monastery of [Tibet](#).
